The start of the academic year is always an exciting time on campus as students return, new SEES members settle in the program and get acquainted with the services SEES has to offer. SEES has kicked off the year with great

momentum as we transitioned to semester and various projects came to fruition in the early months of the fall semester.

The year started off with a bang with the revamping of the Academic Excellence Workshops. As part of the Student Success initiative we now offer STA 1200, MAT 1050, 1140 and 1250 workshops in addition to the traditional CHEM 1210, 1220 and 3150 workshops.

Equally exciting news is the renewal of the LSAMP Research Fellowship Program sponsored by the National Science foundation (NSF) and the Chancellor's Office for the next five years. Grant supports 15 research fellowships to URM STEM students in the colleges of science, engineering and agriculture. In addition, SEES provides research support for traditionally under-represented students majoring in the science fields (College of Science). No citizen/resident requirements.

SEES with the support of the Dean's office will ramp up its involvement with students, create new study and workshop areas, and engage the community. We continue to be passionate about maintaining this energy for the coming academic year and beyond!







Undergraduate Research Information

On Saturday June 9th, 2018, over 1000 students graduated from Cal Poly Pomona's College of Science. Of all the graduates that participated in the ceremony, many of them were from the SEES program. Commencement is a time to celebrate student's success and dedication. It is public recognition of all the hard work and sacrifices the students have devoted to receiving higher education. The SEES graduates proudly wore blue sashes, the color fondly referred to as, "Barbara Burke Blue" in honor of the second SEES director.

This year, 13 SEES students were accepted into PhD programs, 7 into Masters Programs, 5 into Professional schools, and 1 into a Credential Program. We are so proud of the graduates and we wish them well as they step into the big world, prepared to face the new challenges set before them.



2018 SEES Excursion

The La Jolla trip was one of the highlights of the academic year! Mentors, Discovery camp counselors, AEW Facilitators, and Research Scholars were generously invited to spend a fun beach day in La Jolla. We kayaked over the kelp forest and enjoyed the gorgeous sights. Our guides made the trip interesting and even though the waters were too rough to be able to go snorkeling, we still had a great time. We enjoyed a delicious lunch at a nearby restaurant and enjoyed the rest of the day shopping along the cove.

We learned many interesting facts about the cove from our wonderful tour guides! We learned that the reef is too thick for large predators to swim through. We also learned that the reef is actually man-made. In 1970, some folks blew up tons of rocks from Catalina Island and brought them over hoping they would start a kelp forest, and they did! The kelp attracted small fish, the





small fish attracted bigger fish, and the bigger fish attracted sharks. This led to the cove becoming a habitat that supports high biodiversity. The sea lions were very entertaining to watch, but we made sure to stay away from them because they have swim speeds of up to 25 miles per hour!

The La Jolla Underwater park is a 6,000 acre-wide area of ocean floor created by the City of San Diego in 1970. The variation of rocky reef, kelp bed, sand flats, and submarine canyon make it a hotspot for scuba divers, snorkeling and kayaking. What you may not know is that the underwater park contains two artificial reefs created to attract marine life. The first was created in 1964 in 70 feet of water and the second in 1975 at a depth of 40 feet.

This trip was such a generous thank-you from the SEES program!



Discovery
Camps 2018

This was our 4th year offering the summer Discovery camps. We had a record of 647 campers attend this year!

For 10 weeks during the summer, the SEES program at Cal Poly Pomona hosts Discovery Camps. This year was the fifth year of the camps, and there were four different camps offered.

Each of the camps is specific for a different area of STEM; Imagination, Science, Robotics, and Computer Camp. The camps are a fun and safe way for kids to spend their summer!



Imagination (age 5-7) and Science (Age 8-12) camp enjoyed the many different activities and field trips. They went on a tour of the Cal Poly Petting Zoo, ate delicious lunches at Los Olivos and learned all about the many different areas of science! The campers learned about biology, chemistry, and geology to name a few. The kids made slime, learned



about clouds, and had fun roasting marshmallows!

Robotics campers had an awesome time programing and controlling Mindstorm EV3 robots. The kids enjoyed the battle of the bots, where they code robots to follow different commands, and ultimately, have a dance competition!

Computer camp is where all our future graphic designers and software developers go to summer camp. The kids in Computer camp learned commercial software techniques to create both 2D & 3D animation. They were also able to use Cal Poly's 3-D printer to print their very own real-life creations.

The Discovery camps are run by counselors. The counselors have the responsibility of creating their own lesson plans, crafts, and games. If you are interesting in becoming a teacher someday, then the camps are an excellent place to receive hands-on teacher training!
