Project SUCCESS

Mission Statement

Project SUCCESS is a mentoring program to address the national need of men of color retention and persistence in higher education. In its fourth year of operation, Project SUCCESS assists male students of color at Cal Poly Pomona (CPP) with a strategic focus on male African American/Black, Latinx, Native/Indigenous, and American Asian & Pacific Islander first-year students. Through mentorship and intentional connections with CPP faculty, staff, alumni and the community, Project SUCCESS helps students successfully navigate the educational process. Furthermore, Project SUCCESS will contribute to the CSU Graduation Initiative 2025, which focuses on increasing 4-year graduation rates and eliminating the achievement gap between underrepresented minority students and their peer counterparts.

Goals

- Develop and sustain a culturally-relevant mentoring program that advances the success of men of color across the educational pipeline
- Engage men of color participation in cocurricular involvement
- Sponsor the Project SUCCESS First Year Experience Course, specifically designed for men of color student success
- Involve participants' family and parents in the process of learning and engagement for men of color success




Figure 2. A model of community cultural wealth. Adapted from: Oliver & Shapiro, 1995
