Subject: WU's vs F's vs I's; end-of-semester checklist, and a couple of new things!

## Dear faculty,

I hope everyone had a restorative and enjoyable short break last week, gaining enough energy to finish the semester with some reserves. As we finish, here's a useful bit about grades, and a tip for helping your students finish strong as well. (See <u>Policy 1601</u> on grades – and when in doubt, consult your department chair.)

- What's the difference between WU and F, and does it matter which I put in BroncoDirect? "WU," or unauthorized withdrawal, is conferred when a student does not complete enough work in the course for a letter grade to be conferred. "F" is conferred when adequate work is completed to determine that the student has not achieved progress enough to pass the class. For example, a student who takes the first exam and then completes little or no further work should probably be graded WU. A student who takes all the exams but does not pass them should probably be graded F. WU and F have the same impact on a student's GPA, but yes, it matters what you put. A WU may be able to change to an authorized withdrawal, so it's to a student's benefit for you to confer these grades correctly.
- When should I give an Incomplete? An "I" or "Incomplete" is given when a student has completed the majority of the coursework but is interrupted in their progress, and can complete the rest in a reasonable time. A "contract" specifies what work must be completed, by when. For example, a student who has passed three out of four exams and has a family medical emergency that prevents them from being able to adequately prepare for the final might be offered an incomplete. An "I" should not be offered if a student is failing the course. Lecturers can confer Incompletes; the department follows up on the contract.
- A <u>semester wrap-up checklist</u> can help everyone finish stronger with fewer emails on your part. Notice the crossed-off item writing the checklist revealed that I had planned too much and should back off. The checklist took about 15 minutes, so it's a small investment for a good return. (Bonus checklists like this for your own, non-class projects can clear your head and allow you to identify things that can wait until later.)
