Subject: Thoughts on final grades; uploading grades to Canvas gradebook

Dear faculty,

Here's an old but useful thought for making our way through the gargantuan task of giving final grades: **Don't spend much time giving feedback.**

What?! What heresy is this?! Don't give feedback?! When feedback on work is one of the most important things we can do for students??!

The end of the semester is a special case. The final paper, the final project, the final exam -- it's over. Feedback is only useful if there's time to use it, and right now? There's no more time to revise. Extensive comments will not help most students to learn more, and it won't help anyone get a better grade. So don't spend time on it. Use checks on a rubric rather than time-consuming narrative to justify the grade.

If you have promised final feedback to students or you have a situation in which feedback *will* help them, then of course give it. You might reframe it, though: Commentary might point out strengths to build on, rather than discuss weaknesses to overcome.
