Subject: Talking to students about grades

Dear faculty,

We're getting to the point in the semester that students have questions about grades and some students begin advocating for adjustments. This can take up a lot of time, and even more energy and head-room for faculty. Here are ideas to try, with a hat tip to Michelle Elrod in EODA and a promise of sessions next semester on this topic:

- Note patterns of questions or complaints. If something in your course design, grading system, or syllabus leads to issues, make a note and consider later if an adjustment could head problems off next semester. (Do not take this to mean "consider watering down your expectations.")
- Don't hold long conversations over email. If a simple, short explanation does not suffice, require that the student talk to you further on Zoom or in person. You can send a short follow-up summary email to document the conversation. It seems like this would take even more time, but the opposite is likely true: We all know how much time and energy it can take to write a clear, calm email just once, let alone a back-and-forth email chain with an increasingly upset student.
- Staying short also helps to keep language matter-of-fact, without parenthetical or editorial comments that can escalate a conflict. I find that removing adjectives and adverbs helps to make sure I'm not letting my opinions or ego inform my communication with students.
