**Subject**: Grades in Canvas and many programs & resources!

Dear faculty,

One way to reduce questions and problems in your class is to ensure that students have an accurate picture of their grade progress when they look at Canvas.

Here are a few easy things that will help a lot:

- Use <u>Assignment Groups</u> to accurately reflect weight percentages from your syllabus, if you use percentages
- Actively enter a zero (0) if students do not submit required assignments. If there's a dash in the
  grade field for an assignment for a student, Canvas does not factor that assignment into to their
  grade.
- Remove the "Total" column from students' view
- If you want to see what your students are seeing, you can enter mock-up grades into your <u>Test</u> <u>Student's</u> grade fields, turn on the Student View, and see grades as if you were the Test Student.

Caution your students that however up-to-date you keep Canvas grades, the semester isn't over until it's over! Also, students *should* take responsibility for pro-actively tracking and understanding their own grades, reaching out to you with questions and concerns; they should not just "believe" Canvas. This could be a career readiness learning outcome for your course -- similar to understanding one's paycheck and bank account info. Do your part, though, by giving them as accurate information as possible.

On another topic entirely, I want to amplify the invitation that everyone received last week in your individual email, to respond to the <u>Principles of Community</u> survey by Feb. 9. Find the survey link in your email with the subject "Principles of Community Survey." It's fun to enter the drawing for \$100 Bronco gift cards, but the real value is considering values for the academy at large and for Cal Poly Pomona in particular. Although the survey was simple, it was thought-provoking and I appreciated the time I spent on it.
