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Problem

- Considered one of the most marginalized groups in Western society, the lives of people with disabilities have been defined by being personally, socially, and institutionally cast-off and discriminated against (Hall, 2005).
- People with learning disabilities experience disproportionate levels of violence and victimization that negatively impact both mental and physical health and general well-being (Wiseman & Watson, 2022).

Solution

- Embody the Nguzo Saba, or the Seven Principles, to celebrate Black excellence and center Black joy.
- Reimagine the college transition journey for neurodivergent Black scholars through radical community building.
- Uphold programming and collaborations designed to deepen understanding of and alignment with the Nguzo Saba and values consistent with the Disability Justice movement (Sins Invalid, 2005).



Process in Solving the Problem


- Align the project with the work of Let's Talk Learning Difference's Intersectionality Working Group.

- Build a synergistic partnering ecosystem that allows us to deploy the requisite human resources in response to the operational and resource curation needs of the project.

- RECRUIT Black neurodivergent activists/self-advocates, scholars, and practitioners to serve as mentors.
- TARGET outreach to local school and community college campus-based neurodiversity advocacy groups, as well as community college admissions professionals, disability support services professionals, and school-based college counselors to build a steady pipeline of candidates for the professional training and development element of the project.
- LEVERAGE social networks to engage in radical community and coalition building.
- DEVELOP a project website which will serve as a central hub for managing content and information about the project's work.



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


Problem
