Use this handout to prioritize the requirements on your Degree Curriculum Sheet (22-23). This will keep you on track to graduation: try to complete the following requirements by the year in your education indicated. Take 10 courses per year (averaging 5 per semester) to graduate in 4 years. You need 120 semester units to graduate.

## Year 1

- GE A2: Written Communication - follow your DSP placement: ENG 1100 (Fall) + 1101 (Spring) or ENG 1100M (Fa) + 1101M (Sp) or ENG 1103 (Fa or Sp) or ENG 1103M (Fa or Sp)
- GE B4: Quantitative Reasoning - follow your placement; consider MAT 1910: Survey of Mathematics or STA 1200: Statistics w/Applications or STA 1201/A + STA 1202: Statistics w/Applications Stretch I + II
- GE C2: Foreign Language - You will need to successfully complete a course at the 2000 (Intermediate) level for the major. If you need to start a language from the beginning, that means taking 2 semesters at the Elementary level, and then fulfilling the requirement by taking a $3^{\text {rd }}$ semester at the Intermediate level.
- Major required core -
- ENG 1000: English First-Year Experience (take in Fall if possible)
- ENG 2200: Introduction to English Linguistics (prerequisite for upper-division linguistics courses)
- Start taking 2000-level literature courses as early as you can (prereq: GE A2). Note: Take ENG 2710: World Literature I instead of ENG 2720 for World Lit. It fulfills a Single Subject Credential Directed Coursework requirement.
- Other lower-division GE courses: A1, A3 (this is a prerequisite for many ENG courses, so take it your first year if you can), B1, B2, B3, C1, D1, D2, E, and F. Note: Your Degree Curriculum Sheet specifies what to take for A1 and C1 under Single Subject Credential Directed Coursework.


## Year 2

- Make progress on lower-division GE courses (everything except B5, C3, and D4). Take GE A3 if you didn't in your first year (prerequisite for 3000-level writing classes).
- Major Required core -
- Try to finish taking your 2000-level literature courses and foreign language courses
- ENG 3150: Advanced Expository Writing and 3151: Writing for the Professions (if you can)
- ENG 3210: Grammar of Modern English (prereq: ENG 2200)
- Single Subject Credential Directed Coursework - take ENG 2801: Young Adult Literature or ENG 3520: Harry Potter as Literature and Culture or ENG 3800: Children's Literature


## Year 3

- Major Required core - ENG 3000: Introduction to Literary Studies (prerequisite for 4000-level literature courses)
- Subplan/Option Required -
- ENG 3110: Introduction to Rhetorical Theory (prerequisite for 4000-level literature courses)
- ENG 3212: Language Acquisition
- ENG 3152: Literacy, Language \& Cultural Practices or ENG 3010: Literary Theory \& Cultural Studies or ENG 3011: Literature, Power \& Politics or ENG 3012: Digital Research Methods
- ENG 3153: Theory to Practice in Student Literacy (offered only in Fall, prerequisite for ENG 4630)
- ENG 4150: Multimedia Practicum
- Subplan/Option Electives - start Genre, Decentered Canons, and Focused Inquiry courses after completing ENG 3000 and 3110 (or ENG 3010, 3011, or 3012). Note: Take ENG 4503: Shakespeare before 1600 for Genre. If you didn't take ENG 2710: World Literature I for the World Lit requirement, also
take ENG 4882: Myth as Literature or ENG 4883: The Epic.
- Complete lower-division GE courses and begin upper-division GE courses (B5, C3, D4). Note: Your Degree Curriculum Sheet specifies what to take for A1, C1, C3, and D4 under Single-Subject Credential Directed Coursework.


## Year 4

- Complete Major Required core and Subplan/Option Electives
- Take ENG 4411: English Education Teaching Practicum as your Polytechnic Experience course (if offered; otherwise, take any Polytechnic Experience course)
- Culminating Experience - ENG 4630: English Education Capstone Seminar (offered only in Spring)
- Complete upper-division GE courses (B5, C3, D4). Note: Your Degree Curriculum Sheet specifies what to take for C3 and D4 under Single-Subject Credential Directed Coursework.
- Credential Coursework (optional) -
- EDU 5010: Foundations of Teaching and Learning,
- EDU 5020: Foundations of Education in a Diverse Society, and/or
- EDU 5200: Secondary Reading and Writing

## English Education major option - 2-year students

Use this handout to prioritize the requirements on your Degree Curriculum Sheet (22-23). This will keep you on track to graduation: try to complete the following requirements by the year in your education indicated. You should plan to take 10 courses per year (averaging 5 per semester). You need 120 semester units to graduate. Note that a maximum of 70 semester units ( 105 quarter units) of community college course credit may be applied toward the BA.

## Year 1

- Check whether you need to take any courses required for lower-division GEs. Note: If you are pursuing the Single-Subject Credential to teach middle or high school English, take COM 2204: Advocacy and Argument for A1 and TH 2030: Introduction to Theatre for C1. You will need to take these classes even if you have already fulfilled the GEs with other courses.
- Take 1-2 upper-division GE courses (B5, C3, D4), if you can. Note: Your Degree Curriculum Sheet specifies what to take for C3 and D4 under Single-Subject Credential Directed Coursework.
- Major Required core -
- ENG 1000: English First-Year Experience (take in Fall if possible; required for transfer students)
- ENG 2200: Introduction to English Linguistics (prerequisite for upper-division linguistics)
- If you haven't completed the 2000-level literature surveys (one each in American, minoritized, British, and world literatures), make progress on those. (Taking at least 1 is a prerequisite for ENG 3000, but ideally you would have taken them all. If you took ENG 2720: World Literature II instead of ENG 2710: World Literature I, you will need to take ENG 2710: World Literature I or, for the Genre requirement, ENG 4882: Myth as Literature or ENG 4883: The Epic.)
- Double-check your progress on the Foreign Language requirement: You will need to successfully complete a course at the 2000 (Intermediate) level for the major. If you need to start a language from the beginning, that means taking 2 semesters at the Elementary level, and then fulfilling the requirement by taking a $3^{\text {rd }}$ semester at the Intermediate level.

## Year 2

- Complete the Major Required core (take ENG 4411: English Education Teaching Practicum as your Polytechnic Experience course, if offered; otherwise, take any Polytechnic Experience course), Subplan/Option Required courses, and Subplan/Option Electives (start Genre, Decentered Canons, and Focused Inquiry courses after completing ENG 3000 and 3110 [or ENG 3010, 3011, or 3012])
- Culminating Experience - ENG 4630: English Education Capstone Seminar (offered only in Spring)
- Credential Coursework (optional) -
- EDU 5010: Foundations of Teaching and Learning,
- EDU 5020: Foundations of Education in a Diverse Society, and/or
- EDU 5200: Secondary Reading and Writing
