I. Catalog Description

Introduction to Music (3)

An introduction to the concepts of reading and writing music; cross-cultural study of music, its values, structures, and functions. Course fulfills GE Sub-area C1.

III. Expected Outcomes

1. Develop introductory skills in reading and writing Western musical notation

2. Acquire an understanding of the basic elements of music and their

interrelationships, and be able to apply this understanding, cross-culturally.

3. Develop concepts of function and meaning of music in society.

4. Acquire knowledge of principles of musical transmission and acculturation in culture.

5. Acquire an understanding how music is an integral part of cultures.

6. Experience elementary level of music making by singing and/or with instruments such as pianos or recorders.

(Students learn the art of music writing, a non-verbal communication skill, which requires guided practice and repetition. Weekly written assignments are required.)

(Works that are considered masterworks, including aural and written documents from various cultures and locales, will be covered in lectures and assignments. Students also are required to attend concerts, either on campus or off, that are enabled by written music.)

VII. Course Outline

1. Elements of music. Rhythm: its components in cross-cultural contexts. Various notational systems. Meter, measure structure, simple, compound, additive. Interval, melody, embellishment. Scale, mode; articulation, phrases, cadences. Harmony, concepts of consonance and dissonance, harmonic intervals. Form, proportion and balance. Improvisation and improvisation in performance of written music.

2. Elementary performing: singing and/or keyboard or other instrumental experiences.

3. Musical instruments. Differences in manufacture of instruments. Geographical influences. Technology and musical instruments. Classification of musical instruments. Reasons for classifying musical instruments.

4. Music as a component of society. Why we make music. Functions of music in society: religious, ritual, entertainment, therapy, music in rites of passage. Musical transmission: oral tradition versus literary tradition. Musical acculturation. Cultural characteristics in music.

5. The nature of music. Contemporary definitions of music in various cultures. Characteristics of sound, tone, pitch. Music versus noise: how society determines what is and is not music. Music, a form of communication, what/how music communicates.

6. Concerts. History of concertizing, public concerts. How written music enables large ensembles to perform together. Concert etiquette.

VIII. Instructional Methods

Classes will be taught via lecture/demonstration, with some use of classroom discussion in large and/or small groups and class participation in singing or performing on instruments.

Attendance at one or more concerts is required. Students will write a review of the concert(s) as part of the writing component of the class.

IX. Evaluation of Outcomes

Performance and written exams will be given. Instructors may use weekly exams or quizzes, standard midterm and final exam, or any combination.

Meaningful writing component includes two written concert reports, one due midterm, the other at term's end. Also, students are learning the process of writing music, and homework will include regular and reiterative assignments in music writing.
