I. Catalog Description

Introductory study of the thematic, poetic, melodic, structural, rhythmic and harmonic components of a song. Individual projects in songwriting. 2 hours lecture/discussion

II. Required Coursework and Background

Prerequisite(s): MU 100, MU 1000, MU 120, or MU 1201

III. Expected Outcomes

Students will:

- 1. Examine the history of some of the more prominent forms of songwriting, particularly those of 20th and 21st centuries' popular music.
- 2. Analyze the elements that make up a song, including its thematic, poetic, melodic, structural, rhythmic and harmonic components.
- 3. Listen to and analyze recordings of songs.
- 4. Create and collaborate on original songs and perform them in class.
- 5. Complete a paper and presentation.
