I. Catalog Description

Rehearsal and performance of a complete opera, operetta, or musical theatre selection. Technical crews, singing, and acting.

II. Required Coursework and Background

Enrollment by audition.

Singing and acting proficiency as determined by an audition for the director(s).

III. Expected Outcomes

Students will gain or learn:

- 1. An understanding of performance techniques necessary for a successful production of a complete musical or opera.
- 2. Stage experience in a large performance space.
- 3. The possible experience of working with a conductor and instrumental ensemble
- 4. experience working on complete acting and singing roles
- 5. Performance pacing experience
- 6. Experience with participating in the preparation and execution of technical theatre aspects of a stage production

7. They will achieve greater confidence as performers and be exposed to most aspects of music theatre production.

IV. Instructional Materials

Instruction consists of warm ups, musical rehearsals, and staging rehearsals. The cast will meet during each class period for exercises in stage movement, improvisation, communication, and listening. The director will assign materials to be learned and then practice with cast members and rehearse specific scenes or segments of the opera or musical.

After most of the music is learned the director works on blocking, character development, character relationships, movement and interpretation of the roles. Students will work on technical crews to help produce the show.

V. Minimum Student Material

Music and music score, if appropriate for the selections for performance; pencil, notebook, comfortable rehearsal attire (for movement possibility).

VI. Minimum College Facilities

Rehearsal space to adequately rehearse staging, recital hall or university theater, piano, venue with stage and lighting options, sets, make-up, seating for audiences.

VII. Course Outline

Performance material (show or scenes) will be selected by the director. Auditions will take place at the end of the previous term. The class may require more than one term to complete preparation. Rehearsals will be scheduled for leading roles, particular scenes, chorus scenes, etc. depending on the nature of the show. Musical rehearsals and memorization of the score will be the first priority. After the music is learned, the staging will begin.

Preparation will include information/discussion about the background of the show or scenes and plans for executing the performance.

The show will be blocked over the course of several weeks, followed by rehearsals and several lengthy dress rehearsals. Technical rehearsals will allow for integration of technical aspects of the show with the performance aspects. There will be 3-8 performances based on cost, nature of work, and availability of the theatrical space.

VIII. Instructional Methods

Instruction will include vocalizes, music rehearsals, staging rehearsals, dress rehearsals, and work days for technical theatre aspects of production.

Once music is mastered, the director will work on blocking, character development, character relationships, movement, and interpretation of the role.
