I. Catalog Description

Weekly individual instructional lessons. Repertoire and technical studies at a higher level than MU 1730, selected appropriately for flute, oboe, clarinet, bassoon, or saxophone. Jury examination required. Available to Bachelor of Music majors only.

II. Required Coursework and Background

Prerequisite(s): Successful completion of MU 1730 or MU 1731 requirements and passing entrance requirements for upper division studio. Permission to enroll by instructor only.

Co-requisite(s): MU 2770 and appropriate ensemble.

<u>Upper Division Requirements – Woodwind</u>

Woodwind instruments:

- a. Three contrasting solo works one accompanied (one solo work should be a concert/sonata movement the other can be an etude or additional concerto/sonata movement) in contrasting styles (lyrical/technical).
- b. All major and minor scales (all 3 versions of minor) for all keys
- c. Students will provide the jury panel with a complete list of all repertoire studied during their lower division lessons, organized to show each category studied.

III. Expected Outcomes

The student will be able to perform:

- 1. A selected amount of repertoire.
- 2. Technical studies

The outcomes of this course relate to the following Music Department Student Learning Outcomes:

- #1: Perform a variety of music with expression and musical accuracy.
- #3: Demonstrate musicianship skills (including those involving technology) and conceptual understandings.
- #4: Demonstrate and articulate personal growth as a musician and student of music in the world.
