I. Catalog Description

Weekly individual instructional lessons. Repertoire and technical studies at a higher level than MU 1780 or MU 1781. Jury examination required. Available to Bachelor of Music majors only.

II. Required Coursework and Background

Prerequisite(s): Successful completion of MU 1780 or MU 1781 requirements and passing entrance requirements for upper division studio. Permission to enroll by instructor only.

Co-requisite(s): MU 2770 and appropriate ensemble.

<u>Upper Division Jury Requirements – Electric Bass</u>

Electric Bass:

- a. At least 3 contrasting solo works (for example, a bass melody arrangement, or a rhythmically clear "walking bass line" presentation of a chordal accompaniment to a standard, or demonstrated ability to improvise over changes presented by an accompanist or recording.)
- b. Major and minor scales in all keys in two or three octaves (according to range).
- c. Students will provide the jury panel with a <u>complete list</u> of all repertoire studied during their lower division lessons, organized to show each category studied.

III. Expected Outcomes

Student will:

- 1. develop and improve skills in bass performance
- 2. gain a working understanding of different techniques and styles.
- 3. demonstrate increasing mastery of the instrument

The outcomes of this course relate to the following Music Department Student Learning Outcomes:

- #1: Perform a variety of music with expression and musical accuracy.
- #3: Demonstrate musicianship skills (including those involving technology) and conceptual understandings.
- #4: Demonstrate and articulate personal growth as a musician and student of music in the world.

BM General:

- 1. **demonstrate** a high level of musicianship that facilitates independent preparation of music for performance.
- 4. **articulate** the distinguishing characteristics of multiple musical styles, traditions, and historical periods, **and apply** that knowledge to performance.

IV. Instructional Materials

Materials used in this course will be drawn from recent popular and jazz music literature. Songs, fake books, lead sheets, charts and recordings drawn from thousands of performances will be chosen based upon the style and genre of music studied as well as the students ability.

V. Minimum Student Material

Appropriate instrument and amplifier, music manuscript paper, sheet music.

VI. Minimum College Facilities

Practice room, sound proof studio for the lesson.

VII. Course Outline

Scales and modes commonly used in pop and jazz including and beyond major and minor. Styles, typical bass lines, walking lines. Improvisation. Transcription of exemplary solos and walking lines Preparing the recital

VIII. Instructional Methods

- 1. Students be given specific music to practice and learn.
- 2. Students will perform for the instructor.
- 3. The instructor will evaluate the student's performance and make constructive suggestions on how to improve the techniques and performance.
- 4. Student will work on improvement suggestions and return on a weekly basis for further evaluation and new work assignment.

IX. Evaluation of Outcomes

Students will be evaluated on:

- 1. their consistency of practice
- 2. their technical improvement
- 3. their performance improvement

Students will play for jury examination for evaluation at the end of the quarter. 35% of course grade is from jury grade.
