DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Peter Trofimov, a character from the play that *El Nogalar* is adapted from, Chekhov's The Cherry Orchard, says to Anya: "Oh, it's awful, your orchard is terrible. And when in the evening or at night you walk through the orchard, then the old bark on the trees sheds a dim light and the old cherry trees seem to be dreaming of all that was a hundred, two hundred years ago, and are oppressed by their heavy visions." But this was not the original text as Chekhov had intended. This was a substitute the playwright wrote after a censor asked him to cut the following text: "To own human beings has affected every one of you – those who lived before and those who live now. Your mother, your uncle, and you don't notice that you are living off the labors of Others – in fact, the very people you won't even let in the front door." The original passage was restored after the 1917 revolution in Russia. How beautiful yet tragic yet ironic is it that the themes that Chekhov wrote about for his culture and time work so well when transposed to 2011, Nuevo León, México. The struggles of the working class, the issues with the upper class, and social mobility seem to cycle themselves through history, no matter what country you are from. What moment in the cycle are we at now, in 2023? What is our place in our history, in our cultures? What mark are we leaving behind? What is our legacy?

She has worked as a dramaturg at Teatro Leyden (Chicago), Austin Latinx New Play Festival (Austin, TX), and Pork-Filled Productions (Seattle), as well as working closely with several Latinx playwrights, all to develop their new works. 




