Some time ago, engineering technology alumnus Marty Colombatto visited the campus and saw the condition of our electrical and computer engineering labs. A 1982 graduate, he noted that this was, and I quote, "the same equipment I used when I was here." He also asked how much it would cost to upgrade the lab.

Jump ahead to February 10, when I joined Marty and his wife, Stefanie, at the <u>dedication of the Colombatto Family Laboratory</u>. The new space features 70 new pieces of equipment on 14 stations, replacing the instruments used during Marty's college days. This was all made possible thanks to their \$100,000 donation.

Our hands-on model is what separates us from other universities. We also know that our educational model is costly. If we want our graduates to continue to be in demand, they need to have access to state-of-the-art equipment.

The Colombattos' gift will do just that. This is the power of philanthropy; individuals and companies recognizing where gifts can make a difference. Cal Poly Pomona is filled with these kinds of success stories, dating back to 1949 when W.K. Kellogg and the Kellogg Foundation successfully deeded the land we are standing on today to the state so as to advance education.

I want to personally thank Marty and Stefanie for creating another chapter in that legacy.

Landscape architecture Professor Kyle Brown and his class of regenerative studies master's students were at Pomona's Westmont Community Center last week, teaching students and families about waste and composting.

For the past three weeks, our graduate students have been teaching and leading hands-on activities about healthy eating, water conservation, and the different types of energy. The lessons and activities have been targeted to elementary students and their families, but the workshops have been open the public and included about 100 people overall.

Another sterling example of comes from the Center for Community Service-Learning, which is sponsoring a Community Service Day in the Angeles National Forest on Saturday, Mar. 3. And since I am on a sustainability run, let me congratulate the teams involved in the design and construction of Phase 4 at Innovation Village. The building has earned LEED Gold Certification.

This high-performance facility is the second building now being occupied by Southern California Edison. Some of the green building features include effectively managing storm water runoff to reduce water pollution and a carefully selected landscape palate to lessen water consumption.

In addition, a large roof-top photovoltaic system will generate more than 122 thousand kilowatts of clean, renewable onsite energy. Through the purchase of renewable energy credits, 70 percent of the building's energy usage has been offset.
