Our <u>student chapter of the American Society of Civil Engineers</u> took first place in the Pacific Southwest Conference and competition. Hosted by our own civil engineering department, the event included 1,000-plus civil engineering students from 18 universities in Central and Southern California, southern Nevada, Arizona and Hawaii.

The Broncos placed first in four categories and second in two. They topped Arizona State, the University of Arizona, UCLA, UC Irvine, Hawaii and Cal Poly San Luis Obispo among many others. The concrete canoe team will move on to the ASCE national competition at the University of Nevada in Reno on June 14-16, just one week after commencement. I apologize for not mentioning this great achievement last week. The entire department deserves special kudos for hosting an excellent conference.

Cal Poly Pomona's Model United Nations team has received the Distinguished Delegation award at the National Model UN Conference in New York, representing the Republic of Cyprus. This marks the 15th consecutive year that the team has received recognition at the national conference. The Model UN is the largest student-administered conference in the United States, attracting about 400 colleges and universities from the U.S. and some 60 from overseas, with a total of about 3-4000 students.

The Kellogg Distinguished Public Lecture Series continues next Thursday, April 19, when Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist <u>Isabel Wilkerson</u> will discuss her New York Times bestseller. The event begins at 7 p.m. in the University Theatre. It is free and open to the public.

Her book, "The Warmth of Other Suns," brings to life the great migration of roughly 6 million African Americans from the South to the north and western United States in search of a better life.

Wilkerson interviewed more than 1,200 people and unearthed archival research. Her book focuses on the lives of three individuals and also compares this epic migration to the migration of other peoples in history.

Congratulations to mathematics Professor Randall Swift, who has been chosen as the 2011-12 winner of the Ralph W. Ames Distinguished Research Award in the College of Science.

Dr. Swift has an outstanding record of scholarly work in mathematics. He has published widely and prolifically as the author of more than 80 journal articles, three research monographs and three textbooks. In addition, he has served as the principal investigator or co-PI on numerous federal and state grants totaling in excess of \$2.76 million dollars.

Randall will be formally recognized at the College of Science commencement on Sunday, June 10.
