




MESSAGE FROM PRESIDENT IRIS S. LEVINE

Janet "Jean" Kellogg and W. Keith Kellogg II were longtime supporters of the university. In 1999, the Kelloggs donated \$200,000 to match contributions to the President's Council Scholars program. Their gift inspired numerous individual and family donations, leading to the creation of a significant endowment fund.

W. Keith Kellogg II is the namesake and grandson of cereal magnate W.K. Kellogg, one of the university's founders. He and Janet were champions of the W. Keith and Janet Kellogg University Art Gallery, which was expanded because of their generous support. The Honors College was named the Keith & Jean Kellogg Honors College in 2006 after a generous bequest from the W. Keith Kellogg II Trust.

In 1994, W. Keith Kellogg II received an honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters from Cal Poly Pomona and was also recognized as an honorary university alumnus. He passed away in 2005; Janet Kellogg passed away in 2014.


JAMES H. JONES President's Scholar

Lucas also found community at CPP. "I found my people. It's such a great environment to be surrounded by classmates who care just as much as I do about building better cities." Lucas believes in taking a holistic approach to his education both inside and outside the classroom. From building a 100,000-word searchable database built on class notes to help classmates to his leadership in the American Planning Students Association club where he helped secure a competitive grant to sponsor 13 students' travel to the National Planning Conference, Lucas models the positive impact of channeling curiosity into meaningful action. Do Kyung's interest in landscape architecture emerges from her background in art and her lived experience of migration. Navigating two cultural contexts made her keenly aware of the relationship between identity and place, and of the ways landscapes hold memory and meaning. This perspective has been shaped by travel and a daily drawing practice, which helps her slow down, observe and uncover connections across her experiences. Drawing in particular has sharpened Do Kyung's sensitivity to sensory systems, teaching her to read her embodied responses and, in turn, imagine how design might evoke connection for others. Her encounters abroad, including a trip to Northern Ireland to study Derry's public spaces, affirmed her belief that landscapes can carry transnational echoes of struggle and solidarity and transcend borders. Now pursuing her Master of Landscape Architecture at Cal Poly Pomona, Do Kyung says, "Looking ahead, I hope to build a career in restoration and conservation, focusing on projects that strengthen ecosystems and communities alike." For her, design is a way to cultivate belonging while embracing the spirit of possibility.






