


# MESSAGE FROM PRESIDENT Soraya M. Coley

# Drs. Janet & W. Keith Kellogg II

Janet "Jean" Kellogg and W. Keith Kellogg II were longtime supporters of the university. In 1999, the Kelloggs donated \$200,000 to match contributions to the President's Council Scholars program. Their gift inspired numerous individual and family donations, leading to the creation of a significant endowment fund.

W. Keith Kellogg II is the namesake and grandson of cereal magnate W.K. Kellogg, one of the university's founders. He and Janet were champions of the W. Keith and Janet Kellogg University Art Gallery, which was expanded because of their generous support. The Honors College was named the Keith & Jean Kellogg Honors College in 2006 after a generous bequest from the W. Keith Kellogg II Trust.

In 1994, W. Keith Kellogg II received an honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters from Cal Poly Pomona and was also recognized as an honorary university alumnus. He passed away in 2005; Janet Kellogg passed away in 2014.

JASEN STRAND MEMORIAL President's Scholar



Teaching himself how to meet these expectations earned Mark an A in the class and the confidence to know that he "truly can do anything I put my heart to. This experience is one of the biggest reasons I have gotten to this point in my education." As a math tutor for the Learning Resource Center, Mark is grateful to teach what he loves and hopes to be both a researcher and college math educator to show others that mathematics "is beautiful and interconnected in many ways." A first-generation student with autism, he wants to secure a job that is suitable for his disability and enjoyable. After obtaining his bachelor's degree, Mark hopes to pursue a master's degree, conduct research related to real analysis and teach college.



TINA and PETER STRAND created the scholarship in memory of their son, Cal Poly Pomona mechanical engineering student Jasen Strand who was diagnosed with Duchenne's Muscular Dystrophy at age six and who passed away in 2010. 

Without stable housing, it is so challenging to focus on long-term goals because the daily tasks of surviving become so difficult." Focusing on affordable housing and development, Mahdi now balances his 3.95 GPA in full-time classes with a full-time job at the Inner City Law Center and strives toward his goal of removing housing barriers. "As an urban planner, I will prioritize uplifting low-income communities and communities of color and advocate to end homelessness once and for all." Mahdi is grateful for scholarship support and the leadership skills he has learned in his program.




