# Get Tested Before and After Holiday Travel and Gatherings

With more people traveling and gathering around the holidays, it's a good idea to get tested and reduce the risk of COVID-19 transmission. If you're planning a getaway or attending a holiday party, you can voluntarily test for free at the <u>Public Health Testing</u> <u>Site at the CLA Paseo</u>. Testing provides you with valuable information. The university can also detect and prevent a potential outbreak in our community. Walk-ins at the public health testing site are welcome, but it's recommended to make an appointment.

#### At-Home Test Kits

LA County and Orange County residents can request free COVID-19 self-testing kits. The test kits are helpful if you have COVID-like symptoms or think you had an exposure. There are additional county-specific eligibility requirements to request the kits. ## Public Health Testing Site: Schedule in December and January

The <u>Public Health Testing Site at the CLA Paseo</u> will continue in 2022 for both required testing and voluntary testing. For 2021, the testing site's final day is Friday, Dec. 17. It will re-open the first week of January 2022. For employees and students on campus Dec. 20-23 and Jan. 3-5, testing will be available at Student Health by appointment only. # **To-Do List**

#### Upload Your Vaccine Record

All Cal Poly Pomona students and employees accessing the campus and university programs are required to be vaccinated against COVID-19, unless they have requested a medical or religious exemption. Once you're vaccinated, be sure to <u>upload your record</u> for verification.

### **Religious Exemption to Vaccination**

Faculty, staff and students may request a religious exemption to the vaccination requirement. Students and employees should access the <u>Religious Exemption Form</u>. Visit the <u>Vaccine Information page</u> for more information or email <u>religiousexempt@cpp.edu</u> with your questions and concerns.

#### Medical Exemption to Vaccination

Students and state employees may request a medical exemption to the vaccination requirement. Students should <u>complete the PDF form</u> and upload it to MyHealthPortal. State employees should email the ADA coordinator at <u>ADACoordinator@cpp.edu</u>.

### Students: 100% Remote and Seeking Vaccine Exemption?

Students who are entirely remote in spring 2022 and will not access the campus or inperson university programs may seek an exemption to the vaccine requirement. This applies only to students who are taking all remote/virtual classes and do not plan to come to campus for work, events, club meetings, activities, library, sports, etc. The deadline to submit the self-attestation was Dec. 3. Students who have questions and concerns (including deadline extension) should email attestexempt@cop.edu.

#### Faculty: 100% Remote and Seeking Vaccine Exemption?

Faculty who are entirely remote in spring 2022 and will not access the campus or inperson university programs may seek an exemption to the vaccine requirement. This applies only to faculty who do not plan to come to campus for class, meetings, research, events, library, etc. Please note that this option is temporary and subject to change based on student, department and operational needs. Faculty submitting a selfattestation will be required to comply with the CSU Interim COVID-19 Vaccination Policy if there are changes to their course modality and/or if there is a need to access campus facilities and/or participate in any in-person activities. The deadline for faculty to <u>submit</u> the <u>self-attestation</u> is Jan. 24. Email Jill Hargis, interim AVP for Faculty Affairs, at <u>lehargis@cpp.edu</u> for details and questions.

### **Reporting Positive Tests to Public Health**

Given the continued substantial transmission of COVID-19 and concerns about the Omicron variant, LA County Public Health is asking colleges and universities to report positive case(s) if the individual(s) have traveled by air, domestically or internationally, in the 14 days prior to positive test date or symptom onset date. Cal Poly Pomona's Incident Investigation Team is continuing to follow all guidelines and has updated its incident investigation process.

# All COVID-19 Vaccines Approved for Booster Doses

All adults should be fully vaccinated and get a booster shot, according to public health experts. Booster shots are recommended to protect your health and our community. Confused about which vaccine, when to get it, and who should get it? Consult this handy guide by LA County Public Health to determine your next step.

#### Stay Healthy During Flu Season

The flu season typically lasts for five to six months, so it's never too late to get a flu shot. The best way to protect yourself and our community is to get a flu immunization, in addition to the COVID-19 vaccine. Flu shots are widely available at local pharmacies, medical offices, and free or low-cost clinics. Students can also make an appointment with Student Health on campus to get a free flu shot.
