First Reading 06/01/2016 Second Reading <u>BACKGROUND</u>: The Department of English has put forward a referral for a BA in Applied Language Studies Option for semesters. This is a new program.

Rationale:

This option is primarily an aggregate of existing courses. Its purpose would be to prepare students to gain knowledge and skills that allow them to investigate the relationship between language and the everyday world, including language issues in public policy, education, and business.

In the past decade, the need for professionals with training in linguistics has burgeoned. Upon the completion of the degree, graduates will be able to engage in communities, schools, and professional environments in a multicultural, multilingual world. They will be able to enter the work force directly after completing their B.A., or to pursue further professional education in speech and language disorders, foreign language teaching, computational linguistics, language-data management and analysis, or translation and interpretation.

DISCUSSION:

Before reaching the Academic Programs Committee, this program was reviewed by the College Curriculum Committee in the College of CLASS as well as the Dean of CLASS and the Office of Academic Programs. All concerns raised at those levels were addressed. The Academic Programs Committee then conducted campus-wide consultation, as well as its own review of the program. No concerns were raised.

Justify the need for the proposed aggregate of courses.*

In the past decade, the need for professionals with training in linguistics has burgeoned. The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects significant job growth in areas requiring practical linguistic preparation. For example, the demand for instructional coordinators, including Second Language Specialists in K-12 education and beyond, is expected to increase 13% by the year 2022. The projected growth for careers in speech pathology is 19%, and in translation and interpretation—a staggering 46%. Moreover, hi-tech companies are constantly creating jobs that did not exist two decades ago, but they have become

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necessary in the modern world. These include language database analysts, linguistic data managers, localization specialists, language-solution consultants for marketing and business strategies, and language experts who will work alongside software engineers in developing voice-recognition and voice-to-text technology. Agencies concerned with national security, likewise, have increased the hiring of language analysts, translators and interpreters, discourse and interaction analysts, and so on. These changes in the job market require employees to have a solid background in the study of language as a social science.

Cal Poly Pomona currently offers a variety of practical courses in linguistics at the undergraduate level, which, if taken as an aggregate, will prepare students very well for either entering the work force directly after completing their B.A. or pursuing further professional education in speech and language disorders, foreign language teaching, computational linguistics, language-data management and analysis, or translation and interpretation. At present, however, students can take only one or two of these courses as electives for their B.A. in Literary Studies or English Education. Students choosing a minor in TESL take a few more courses, preparing them to teach English as a Second or Foreign language, but it is only one of the multiple career paths available to a graduate with a more extensive applied linguistics education. The proposed major in Applied Language Studies will prepare the students for the wide array of jobs listed above by combining the currently offered courses under one umbrella, allowing the students interested in the field of applied linguistics to pursue a focused course of study leading to future professionalization.

The linguistics courses currently offered by the department are ENG 317 (Language in Society), ENG 318 (Analysis of Conversation), ENG 319 (Applied Pragmatics), ENG 320 (Structure of Language), ENG 321 (Grammar of Modern English), ENG 322 (The Development of Modern English), and ENG 323 (Language Acquisition). Of these, we offer from 7 sections of ENG 323 per year, 3 sections of ENG 320 per year, and 4 sections of ENG 321 per year. The remaining courses are offered once per year each. Invariably, these courses fill up to capacity (30 or 35 students per course), and many students are on the waiting lists in hopes of getting into the courses. The enrollment patterns very clearly indicate the strong and growing interest in the subject among the students. Creating an option in Applied Language Studies will allow us to channel this interest towards a single specialization and maximize the professional opportunities of the Department's graduates. At the same time, students majoring in Literary Studies or English Education will still be able to take some of the courses as core electives in the required category of linguistics, and the departmental needs will continue to be met.

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The major will require the addition of only two courses. One of these will be a course that has previously been offered as ENG 499 (Teaching English Abroad) to students participating in the Teaching in China Program. We plan to offer this as a regular course on campus open to all students in the university. The second course we will develop will be a capstone course, which will allow the students to conduct a research project, applying all the skills they will have acquired in the program.

ENG 4230 - Teaching English Abroad - 3 semester units

The course focuses on the skills necessary to teach English as a Foreign Language abroad. Students will become familiar with effective foreign language teaching methods, develop cultural awareness and intercultural communication skills, and practice developing and implementing classroom activities for teaching English in a globalized context.

ENG 4820 – Applied Language Studies Capstone – 3 semester units.

This course is designed to provide an opportunity for the students to conduct an individual or small-group research project, using the descriptive and analytical skills in applied linguistics that they have developed in the program. Students will select a topic of interest and explore its current and potential applications in the everyday world. Students will demonstrate an understanding of how key issues and theories in applied language studies shape developments in various professional, industrial, and social fields.
