
- 1,337 new cases and 1,205,276 total cases reported
- 2. 70 new deaths and 22,099 total deaths reported
- 3. 1,119 people currently hospitalized with COVID-19; 30% are in the ICU; 800 hospitalized pre-surge (early November).
- 4. 5,905,000 individuals tested to date with 19% of people testing positive.
- 27.6% ICU capacity remaining in the Southern California Region. (3/9) (40.3% 4-week (April 6) Projected ICU Capacity.)

Points of Note

- LA County has met the threshold for the Red tier, with a current case rate of 5.2; must hold metrics for 2 weeks before official move. Expected move would be 3/17/20.
- Governor's Office is expected to issue updated IHE guidance by week of March 15. LACDPH is hosting a briefing call for IHE's on March 10.

Current tier assignments as of March 9, 2021

Data is reviewed weekly and tiers are updated on Tuesdays. At a minimum, counties must remain in a tier for at least 3 weeks before moving to a less restrictive tier. Counties must meet the next tier's criteria for two consecutive weeks to move to a less restrictive tier.



Vaccination Distribution Update

Points of Note:

- Nearly 20% of Californians 16+ have received at least 1 dose.
- LA County is setting aside 30% of vaccine allocations for educators.
- Campus is participating in LACDPH IHE Vaccine Work Group.
- Biden Administration indicated we will have enough vaccines for every adult in America by May.



Planning Assumptions and Considerations

- Developed decision-making matrix for allowable activities based on current assumptions. Awaiting updated state and county public health guidance later this month (March).
 - Will LA County (LACDPH) be more restrictive than the State of California Department of Public Health (CDPH)?
 - b. When will we have sufficient clarity to make decisions for the Fall?
 - What will be our physical distancing and occupancy restrictions? This decision will be critical for Fall 2021 planning.
 - d. What will be the health screening and mask requirements?
- 2. Continued uncertainty with local conditions, impact of variants, vaccination rates and herd immunity. Cautious optimism for the Fall.
- 3. Legislative reporting requirements (AB 685 and SB 1159) in effect until January 2023 necessitate tracking of in-person activities.
- 4. Third package of federal pandemic relief expected in March, which allocates funding for higher education, including student grants.



Decision-Making Matrix with Tier Parameters

CPP Decision-Making Matrix in the Context of COVID-19

Cal Poly Pomona must comply with public health officer orders issued for institutes of Higher Education (IHE) by the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) and the Los Angeles Department of Public Health (LACDPH) and guidance and directives issued by the CSU. County public health orders can be more restrictive than the state; when it differs, the stricter order prevails. LACDPH will make reopening determinations for Institutes of Higher Education. CDPH guidance issued 9/30/20 and LACDPH Appendix U issued 3/2/21.
