Our university's core mission is supported financially by two main revenue stream in the operating budget: the base budget provided by the annual state appropriation and student tution and fies. The state appropriation is a recurring or ongoing commitment, which allows us to plan coherently to effectively execute our mission in service to our student, the state of California and our nation. Student tution and fees are also collected every year, but vary depending on enrollment numbers, inclusive of international and non-resident students. The CSU is also comprised of many support functions occurring in our self-fund and auxiliary enterprises, and these functions are not financed by the state appropriation or tution. Rather, they are supported by revenues, such as residence hall fees, mean plans, patieng and retail sales, grantat and contracts, and the like. These operations have been severely impacted by the pandemic, and regrettably, these negative impacts will continue in the years shead. Consequently, self-funde and auxiliary enterprises have been forced to lay off many employees, and campues must find other resources to pay debt service and other obligatory costs Our annual fiscal year (FY) extends from July 1 through the following June. Today, we fisce a base budget from the state 's economy. I would like to emphasize here that while we didn't escape a budget reduction, if sci clars were been and consistently demonstrated our value to the state. I kank you for your considerable efforts over the years to conthubute to flat value, and I am grateful to our legislative leaders and the <i>Sciencorf recounstrate</i> .
