I. Welcome & Introductions

Megan Stang, Committee Chair, welcomed the committee members and called the meeting to order at 8:40 a.m.

II. Presentation

Lawrance Edwards

Lawrance Edwards discussed his experience with law enforcement growing up in the South and Compton and what he has done to bridge the gap between the civilian population and law enforcement officers.

III. 3070 Campaign Ideas

David Sedillo

David Sedillo, Communications & Marketing Specialist gave a presentation on the campus extension #3070 emergency line and ideas on communicating the extension throughout campus.

Current Challenges

- Calls to 9-1-1 on a cell phone are routed to CHP dispatch, potentially delaying response time in an emergency.
- The 3070 number is not widely communicated on campus.
- Most students, faculty, and staff do not have the 3070 number saved as a contact on their phones.

Tactics

Increased signage/visibility across campus, especially in high-traffic areas, including online communication spaces (Newsletters, CPP Today, Bronco Bytes, etc.)

Dedicated splash page on cpp.edu/police website with a video tutorial on how to save the (909) 869-3070 number as a new contact.

Outreach tabling events

- Step-by-step guide on creating a new contact on the phone
- Show proof of new contact by phone with the 3070 number to spin a prize wheel
- Free 3070 swag (keychains, stickers, etc.)
- Safety Fair Day

Short videos on social media showing how to create a new contact and explaining why.

Posting signage with the full emergency number 909-869-3079 in all student areas.

IV. Presentation

Peter Hanink

Peter Hanink, Sociology Professor, presented on Police Legitimacy.

Police Legitimacy is a function of public assessments of the fairness of how authorities exercise their discretionary authority when implementing the law.

What are the stakes?

- Law Compliance
- Civilian cooperation with law enforcement efforts
- Empowering police to use discretion

Responses on the following topics vary substantially by race ethnicity

- Trust
- Fair and Impartial
- Treated with dignity & Respect
- Legitimate
- Violent Crime Prevention

What works to repair legitimacy?

- Procedural Justice: the use of dispute-settling procedures that the people involved would say are unbiased, give them a voice, and treat them with respect.
- Reconciliation: a process that emphasizes gestures intended to earn the trust of communities
- These gestures address the community rather than individuals and acknowledge historical and other reasons for any distrust.

- Identify strategies for UPD to bridge the gap between traditional policing and a community policing model that aligns with a university environment, so UPD is more aligned with the educational mission of the institution through a balance of educational approaches with accountability and meeting compliance with state and federal laws.
- Educate students and other campus stakeholders about engagement with law enforcement.
- Engage in further research about community needs and UPD data collection practices.
- Continue the UPD complaint process review.
