STUDENT RESOURCES AND REPORTING OPTIONS FOR SEXUAL VIOLENCE AND RELATIONSHIP ABUSE



AFFIRMATIVE CONSENT IS...

The responsibility of each person involved in the sexual activity to ensure that each participant has the affirmative consent of the other(s) to engage in sexual activity. Affirmative consent must be voluntary, and freely given without coercion, force, threats, or intimidation.

AFFIRMATIVE CONSENT IS NOT...

Given by a person who is incapacitated. A person is incapacitated if they lack the physical and/or mental ability to make informed, rational decisions. Affirmative consent can be withdrawn or revoked at anytime. Consent to one form of sexual activity (or one sexual act) does not consent to other forms of sexual activity.

Affirmative consent is not a lack of protest or resistance.

SEXUAL MISCONDUCT IS...

Engaging in ANY sexual activity without first obtaining affirmative consent to the specific activity.

Examples: Kissing, fondling, intercourse, penetration of any body part, oral sex, and any unwelcomed physical sexual acts.

Sexual misconduct may include physical force, violence, threats, intimidation, causing the other person's intoxication or incapacitation through the use of drugs or alcohol, or taking advantage of the other person's incapacitation (including if the incapacitation is voluntary).

Sexual activity with a minor under 18 is never consensual.

RAPE IS...

Non-consensual sexual intercourse that may involve the use of threats, violence, intimidation, or immediate and unlawful bodily injury.

Any sexual penetration, however slight, is sufficient to constitute rape.

STALKING IS...

A repeated course of conduct directed at a specific person (when based on gender or sex) that places the person's safety or the safety of others at risk, also causing the victim to suffer substantial emotional distress.

RELATIONSHIP VIOLENCE (INCLUDING DATING, DOMESTIC AND INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE) IS...

A form of sexual violence and abuse committed by a person who is or has been in a social, dating, cohabitating, or intimate relationship with the victim, regardless of the length of the relationship or gender.

Relationship violence relies on power, control, and intimidation. Physical violence frequently is accompanied by other forms of abuse, including emotional, psychological, financial or sexual.

Where Do I Go?

TO GET EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE FOR MY SAFETY:

Call 911. If you are in immediate danger, do not hesitate to contact UPD or call 911.

TO TALK:

There are confidential resources on campus that can provide you with support and the basic information about your options and available resources.



TO REPORT A CRIMINAL CONCERN:

We encourage you to contact the CPP University Police Department or the police department where the incident took place.

WHAT IF I WANT TO BE LEFT ALONE?

Remember that these resources are always available to you, and you can seek support at any time. Friends and family can offer support as well. You are not alone, there are people who can help you.



TO GET MEDICAL HELP:

The Wellness center, and medical centers off campus, provide treatment of injuries, STD/STI screenings and pregnancy tests. If you wish to have an evidence collection kit ("rape kit"), SAS or Project Sister Family Services can help in the process.

TO REPORT A CONCERN AND GET SUPPORT:

Students may seek assistance from staff listed as "Reporting Options and Resources." The staff's focus is to protect your privacy; however, to further protect the campus community, they cannot guarantee complete confidentiality.

TO UNDERSTAND THE TITLE IX ADMINISTRATIVE/ DISCIPLINARY PROCESSES:

You are encouraged to contact the University Title IX Coordinator in the Office of Institutional Equity & Compliance. They oversee the investigation of all reports of sexual assault and relationship violence.

In order to ensure the safety of students, in rare circumstances, the university may be obligated to investigate known incidents of sexual assault and relationship violence, even if you may not feel ready. However, such a decision would be discussed with you in advance and the university would ensure that you have a support person throughout the process.
