Accreditation is required for federal (Title IV) and state financial aid programs, as well as transference of college credit. A WSCUC review team will be on campus Oct. 21-23, and there are opportunities for the entire campus community to be participate.

Lanterman Project Moving Forward

With a developer selected and an advisory committee in place, Cal Poly Pomona intends to move forward with crafting a plan for the Lanterman site. Irvine-based developer FivePoint, known for projects such as Candlestick Park in San Francisco and Great Park in Orange County, and the university are moving toward an exclusive negotiating agreement, a crucial step needed before discussions on how to develop the historic site get underway.



President Coley to Serve on Future of Work Commission

Gov. Gavin Newsom has named Cal Poly Pomona President Soraya M. Coley to the newly formed The Future of Work Commission. The 21-member commission was created out of a need to shape "an equitable, sustainable, inclusive economy of the future," according to Newsom. The group will make recommendations about harnessing technology, innovation and lifelong learning to promote better jobs, wages and working conditions, and to ensure that prosperity remains within reach throughout society.



Draft of Campus Master Plan Underway

A draft of the next [Campus Master Plan](#) is expected to be completed by the end of the year, with adoption tentatively scheduled before the end of 2020. Consulting firm Ayers Saint Gross started work on the plan — which assesses the needs of and sets the priorities for capital construction projects —over the summer following a series of workshops for the campus community. The final draft must be completed with required environmental reviews before it is submitted to the Chancellor's Office and the CSU Board of Trustees.



New Residence Halls and Dining Commons Nearing Completion

Construction on a residential community that features eight-story residence halls, a dining commons, a community garden and commons areas for socializing is nearing completion. The new halls are slated to open in Spring semester 2020 are expected to be The addition of the new digs, which involved shifting Kellogg Drive east, will enhance campus life for students, reduce the carbon footprint by reducing the number of students who commute, and improve safety for pedestrians and cyclists.
